#### Linguistics Studies Continue to Expand Globally

Professor **John Frederick Bailyn** was awarded a two-year follow-up grant (2024-2026) by the U.S. Embassy Moscow Public Affairs Section in support of the long-standing summer school he co-directed in St. Petersburg, Russia from 2003-2019. More so, since 2020, it has held nine sessions as a live worldwide virtual Institute V-NYI (The Global NY1 Institute of Cultural, Cognitive, and Linguistic Studies).

This grant will continue to support SBU faculty and allow graduate students to participate in NYI as instructors and TAs, as well as supporting Linguistics students from across the globe in participating in NYI's multi-faceted seminars.

V-NYI #10 will take place this summer from July 10-25, 2025, and will mark the 10th live virtual global NYI Institute and the 27th overall event. Many Department faculty members and students have benefitted from the dynamic programs it offers.

### **Introducing New Faculty Members**

#### Ana Manas Lopez



Ana Manas Lopez, lecturer in the TESOL program, joined us in August 2024 as a full-time faculty member. She is a double alumna of SBU, having received a BA in linguistics (2015) and an MA in TESOL (2018). During her time as an SBU student, Ana became fascinated by the field of language acquisition, especially second language acquisition and bilingualism.

After graduating with her TESOL degree, Ana became an English as a New Language (ENL) teacher and worked directly with students of various levels within high-need school districts. For the last six years, Ana has worked with both newcomers and Students with Interrupted Formal Education (SIFE), in a bilingual classroom setting, and special education ENL students in a self-contained classroom. She has also taught adult ENL to students at an alternative high school. Through her own experience as an ENL student and time in the classroom, Ana has grown extremely passionate about this field.

Ana spent the last three years teaching as a part-time instructor in the SBU TESOL program. Currently, she teaches two pedagogy courses in the program (Methods 1 and Methods 2) and other courses required for the program such as Bilingualism, TESOL and Technology, and a course on Assessments in TESOL. Her specific interests are focused on second language acquisition and literacy development, specializing on students with limited or no formal education.

Ana has implemented many firsthand strategies to help students build literacy all while continuing to monitor their growth and efficacy. Ana has additional experience in examining a variety of curricula focused on assessing, monitoring and teaching in the classroom; has developed and created her own unit plans, lesson plans and assessments to target all proficiencies and ability levels; and served as a textbook reviewer. Furthermore, she has facilitated and conducted multiple development workshops on these topics, attended numerous professional conferences, and has been trained by some of the most influential educators in the United States.

Ana is thrilled to be a part of our Department in a full-time role and looks forward to collaborating with her colleagues, peers, and students.
