**SPEAKER:** Our guest speaker will be Katheryn Twiss, Department of Anthropology

**Bio**: Katheryn C. Twiss is Professor and Chair of the Department of Anthropology. Her research focuses on the ways in which ancient people used food to sustain large, densely populated settlements. She is the author of *The Archaeology of Food: Identity, Politics, and Ideology in the Prehistoric and Historic Past* and co edits the fifty-volume series *Elements in the Archaeology of Food* (Cambridge University Press). A specialist in analyzing animal remains, she has led or co-led faunal analyses at Southwest Asian sites including Çatalhöyük (Türkiye), Ur and Sakhariya (Iraq), and Tel Tif'dan (Jordan).

**Topic**: "Feeding a City and Keeping It Clean: Meat at Ur"

Excavations led by SBU Emeriti Elizabeth Stone and Paul Zimansky at Tell al-Muqayyar, ancient Ur, yielded large quantities of food debris. The remains derive from households located in different parts of the city, allowing us to compare food habits in different neighborhoods. This talk explores how the ancient city's inhabitants acquired their meat, how they distributed and prepared it, and how they handled their garbage. The answers to these questions shed light on topics including the urban economy, community celebrations, and early urban hygiene.

### Craig A. Lehmann - July 30, 1945 — January 26, 2025

Craig A. Lehmann, a distinguished figure in the field of health technology and management, passed away on January 26, 2025, in Riverhead, NY. Born on July 30, 1945, in Oceanside, NY, Craig dedicated over 50 years of his life to the advancement of education and the nurturing of future generations in his role as the Dean of the School of Health Technology and Management at Stony Brook University.

Throughout his illustrious career, Craig was recognized for his commitment to excellence in academia. His leadership and vision not only shaped the School but also left a lasting impact on countless students and colleagues. His contributions to the field were acknowledged widely, inspiring those who had the privilege of knowing him.

Craig is survived by his beloved wife, Susan M. Lehmann, with whom he shared 57 years of marriage, representing a bond filled with love and companionship. He is also survived

by his sons, Aaron Lehmann and Jason Lehmann, along with Jason's wife, Kathleen. Craig's family was his pride and joy, and he cherished every moment spent with them.
