APLU's 2017 Winter Meeting and Innovation Showcase on Capitol Hill Spotlights Stony Brook University

The Association of Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU) hosted its four-day annual winter meeting the week of November 12 in Washington, DC. Stony Brook Brook University President Samuel L. Stanley Jr. served on two panels, "Back Tracking the American Dream?," at which he discussed Stony Brook's success in ensuring economic mobility for our graduates and "The Next Frontier in University Technology Transfer: Evolving into a More Responsive and Engaged Enterprise."

On November 14, APLU and the Association of American Universities (AAU) hosted the inaugural University Innovation and Entrepreneurship Showcase on Capitol Hill, spotlighting 22 startup companies that have created products born out of federally funded, university-based research. The national associations received about 100 highly

competitive applications from more than 40 institutions across the country to participate in the prestigious showcase. Stony Brook University's <u>Traverse Biosciences</u> was selected. Traverse Biosciences is commercializing novel drug candidates for the treatment of inflammatory diseases and related conditions affecting humans and companion animals.

A ceremonial groundbreaking recently took place for the Innovation and Discovery Center (IDC) at the Stony Brook University Research & Development Park. The IDC will support the commercialization of scientific breakthroughs and the growth of high-technology ventures through collaboration between the state, University, and private sector enterprises and funders. The facility will house laboratories advancing research in areas such as biotechnology, information technology, electronics and advanced materials.

Construction of the IDC has been made possible through \$60 million in New York State Senate funding championed by Senator Ken LaValle and Senate Majority Leader John Flanagan along with \$2 million in Long Island Regional Economic Development planning funds. The facility is expected to be completed in Spring 2019.

Stony Brook Leadership Weighs in at National Politics and Public Policy Discussion

On Tuesday, November 7, <u>Judy Greiman</u>, Chief Deputy to the President and Senior Vice President of Government and Community Relations, served on <u>AAU Human Resource Institute's (AAU-HR)'s</u> "Politics, Public Policy and Universities" panel during the association's <u>annual meeting</u> in New York City.

Ms. Greiman discussed how Stony Brook's Office of Government Relations strategically works with Stony Brook's Office of Human Resource Services and member AAU-HR institutions to effectively advocate on Capitol Hill in favor of joint higher education policy goals. Specifically, Ms. Greiman explained Stony Brook University's position and advocacy efforts regarding the "Tax Cuts and Jobs Act." Although the bill recently passed the House on November 16, Stony Brook's Office of Government Relations is pleased that all four Long Island congressional members voted against the House bill. As tax reform negotiations continue, Stony Brook urges leaders in Congress to vote against provisions that would make quality higher education less accessible and limit groundbreaking research conducted in the United States. The Senate bill is expected to be brought to a vote this week.

Stony Brook's Bill Wise Speaks to Congress about Disaster Preparedness

New York Sea Grant Director Bill Wise participated in a legislative briefing, "Using Science and Outreach to Assist State and Local Decision Makers in Disaster Preparedness and Public Safety," on November 8 in Washington, DC, which was sponsored by Congressmen Lee Zeldin (NY) and Joe Courtney (CT).

Wise and others on the panel conveyed the importance of the <u>National Sea Grant College Program</u> (Sea Grant) to Congressional leaders. Specifically, he discussed the <u>Coastal Storm Awareness Program (CSAP)</u>, funded with \$1.8 million from the <u>National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration</u>. This program was initiated after Superstorm Sandy to help understand the factors that influenced coastal residents' actions related to storm warnings and to improve clarity of future warnings.

Federal Budget Update

On November 14, Speaker Paul Ryan (R-Wisconsin) <u>said</u> Congress may need to adopt a short-term spending bill to prevent a December 9 government shutdown, noting, "We might need a little more time to let the appropriators write their bill." Congressional leaders reportedly continue to negotiate potential changes to the Budget Control Act (BCA) caps.

Stony Brook's Office of Government Relations continues to urge House and Senate leaders work to complete FY18 appropriations and reach a bipartisan budget deal to raise the FY18 defense and nondefense spending caps to permit sufficient investment in research and higher education programs critical to our nation's security and prosperity.



Materials Science and Engineering Professor Uses Art to Communicate Science

The study of objects less than a billionth of a meter, also known as "nanometers," is a special research discipline that Materials Science and

Engineering Professor Alexander Orlov has been working on for years. A major breakthrough in this field has been the emergence of a new gener ation of consumer products containing nanoparticles, nano-enabled biomedical devices and many other exciting developments straight out of science fiction novels. However, like many scientific breakthroughs, there is hesitation in the implementation of nanotechnology.

To help the general public understand and accept this new technology, Professor Alexander Orlov began using nanoart to visualize nanotechnology. He teamed up with Marija Iloska, a student studying chemical and molecular engineering in the College of Engineering and Applied Sciences, to infuse colors into the black-and-white nano-objects.


