Director's Message

Another busy year of activities for the Center for Hellenic Studies at Stony Brook University (SBU). We had our biggest cohort of students ever! In addition to our established Modern Greek classes at all levels (Elementary, Intermediate, and Advanced), this year we inaugurated an additional class in Conversational Greek at the Intermediate level. Moreover, our students took extra courses in Greek, exploring Greek history through the ages, geography, and literature. All this resulted in an increased number of students graduating with a minor in Hellenic Studies (Marie Lolis, Dimitra Miloulis, Georgiana Misthos, and Christina Varvatsoulis)!

We enjoyed insightful and exciting lectures on various topics, ranging from the benefits and influence of Greek cuisine to discussion about the Greek diaspora in the US and in Australia, to the history of Greek-speaking Romaniote Jews, and the presentation by a Greek-American author of her highly praised first book! We were delighted to welcome the Consul General of Greece in New York, Ambassador Dino Konstantinou, who spent time interacting with our students and members of the community. And of course, we were excited to co-host with our students-members of the Greek and Cypriot Student Association an evening celebrating the OXI-day as well as a beautiful evening of Greek poetry and songs.

Finally, we were able to host on campus another Hellenic Film Weekend, in collaboration with the Hellenic Film Society USA, which was attended by students, faculty, and the community. We are grateful for all the support we received from our friends: all the people who supported the Center for Hellenic Studies during SBU's Giving Day, the AHEPA chapter of Port Jefferson for supporting, for the fourth year in a row, an essay competition focusing on documenting the journey of Greek-American and Cypriot-American immigrants who arrived in New York fifty or sixty years ago. The AHEPA awards, called now the AHEPA 319 Bobby Gemelas Scholarship, honor the late Bobby Gemelas, a great supporter of Hellenism and the Greek-American heritage.

We are grateful for the continuous support and generosity of Mr. Peter Tsantes and Dr. Eleni Bacola-Ciacco. An intense and great collaboration last year led to the implementation of the Summer Abroad program in Athens, under the leadership of Dr. Maria Athanasopoulou. The program was made possible with the great efforts and organization by Ms. Efie Spentzos, Ms. Mariam Isack, and Ms. Margaret Hartofilis who took the project to their hearts, and the Athenians Society of New York. This year a second group of students is participating in the program, and they are about to take off for Greece to visit and study in Athens, Nafplio, and Aegina with trips to multiple locations in the area.

This year, as well, our collaboration with the Medical School at the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, and through long discussions that involved some of our faculty members (i.e., Drs Tassiopoulos and Georgakis), resulted in the first exchange of medical students between the two schools: three of the SBU medical students are going to Thessaloniki for a month to study there under the guidance of Greek faculty members, and two Greek medical students are coming to SBU to spend a month in the medical school here. Many more scholarship exchanges to come!!

All these activities with our students and our friends helped conclude a successful 2023-2024 academic year. We are energized for the future! Thank you to all. I wish you a nice, relaxing Summer. See you in September!

Greece in the USA: a 21st century perspective

Ambassador Dinos Konstantinou Consul General Consulate General of Greece in New York



Ambassador Dinos Konstantinou has been a member of the Hellenic Diplomatic Service since 1999. He studied Private International Law at Paris II Panthéon-Assas University of Sorbonne. He speaks fluently English, French, Spanish, and Portuguese.

He has served at the Political Department Directorate for European Countries in the Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs. From 2002 to 2005 he was a member of the Embassy of Greece in Washington D.C., serving both at the political and consular sections. He then joined the Diplomatic Cabinet of the Prime Minister of Greece the time, Mr. Karamanlis.

He has served as the political Counselor and Consul at the Embassy of Greece in Buenos Aires, and at the Political Department for Cyprus, dealing with all aspects of this top priority issue for Greece. From 2014 to 2018 he served as the Consul General of Greece in São Paulo, the only Greek General Consulate in Brazil. He returned to Athens in 2018 at the Political Department for Arab Countries & the Middle East. After serving as the Diplomatic Advisor to the Minister of Infrastructure and Transport of Greece, Mr. Kostas Karamanlis, he assumed his duties as Consul General of Greece in New York in August 2022.

"Greek Melbourne" Calling! New Cartographies of Diasporic Belonging

Yiorgos Anagnostou Miltiadis Marinakis Professor The Ohio State University



Being diasporic animates multiple affiliations. It involves connections with immigrant history, the historical homeland, the new home as well as other diasporas. Diasporas orient themselves in space and time in relation to the elsewhere and the here, the then and the now. From this position they engage with their various pasts, configure the present, and project visions for the future. In this talk I explore how Greek Melbourne places its cultural identifications in relation to the cultural and political fabric of its city as well as Greece and Australia. I draw examples from Greek Australian poetry, murals, photography, painting, institutional practices as well as cultural and political activism. How does Greek Melbourne chart its diasporic belonging? What issues does it raise for Greek diasporic production in global cities such as New York City?

Yiorgos Anagnostou is the Miltiadis Marinakis Professor of Modern Greek language and culture at The Ohio State University. His research interests include diaspora and American ethnic studies, with a focus on Greek America. His published research covers a broad range of subjects, including film, documentary, ethnography, folklore, literature, history, sociology, and public humanities. He is the author of *Contours of White Ethnicity: Popular Ethnography and the Making of Usable Pasts in Greek America* (Ohio University Press, 2009 [Greek translation, Nisos 2021]). He is a co-editor of *Redirecting Ethnic Singularity: Italian Americans and Greek Americans in Conversation* (Fordham University Press, 2022). Since 2017 he is the editor of the online journal *Ergon: Greek/American Arts and Letters* (http://ergon.scienzine.com/).

Romaniote Greek-speaking Jews: Their History and Their Story

Marcia Haddad Ikonomopoulos Author of *Meet Me on the Corner of Broome and Allen* Director of Kehila Kedosha Janina Museum



Marcia Haddad Ikonomopoulos has been Museum Director of Kehila Kedosha Janina since 2004 and President of the Association of Friends of Greek Jewry since 1997. As a former educator, writer, editor and translator, she has dedicated her life to telling the story of Greek Jewry. Marcia was honored to be chosen a member of scholarly committee for review, translation and microfilming of Salonika Archives at YIVO and compiled the text and visuals for the USHMM's website on the Holocaust of Greek Jewry. She has often presented at the MGSA (Modern Greek Studies Association) symposiums. She sits on the Board of Trustees for Kehila Kedosha Janina, the Board of Advisors for the Lower East Side Preservation Initiative, the Board of Judaic Studies at Queens College, and is a proud member of AJC (American Jewish Committee) Cyprus Team, where she engages in Diplomatic Outreach.

The presentation, accompanied by visuals, will tell the story of this little-known part of the Jewish and Greek worlds. Their fascinating story, little known and understood shows the bridges that formed between these two civilizations and how, in essence, this interaction formed modern western civilization.



This remarkable story provides a unique intersection between medicine, history, social justice, and the immigrant experience.



Maria Smilios was born and raised in New York City. In 2016, while working as a developmental editor for Springer Science she learned about this extraordinary story and became determined to tell it. She holds a Master of Arts in American literature and religion from Boston University where she was a Luce scholar and taught in the religion and writing program. Her work has appeared in *The Guardian, Narratively, The Forward, Lit Hub, Writers Digest, Dame Magazine, The Rumpus*, and other publications. The city and State of New York recently recognized her for "outstanding service" and "positive contribution" to the people of New York. The book also inspired the Staten Island Museum to curate the exhibit "Taking Care: The Black Angels of Sea View," which is on display through November of 2024.
