AROUND KOREAIN N KINDS OF DIFFERENT CONTROL OF LANDS OF L

ZOOM TALK

Western tourists who venture out of Seoul tend to be surprised by how different the regions of Korea are from one another. That goes for their food and their scenery, but also for their language, given that each part of the country has its own saturi, or dialect. This talk constructs a kind of "tour" of Korea through a variety of culturally or linguistically illuminating expressions from different provinces, from the distinctive -shu ending used in Chungcheong-do to the all-purpose geoshigi of Jeolla-do to the greeting honjeoopseove from the practically foreignsounding saturi of Jeju Island. Though the people talk in Seoul doesn't necessarily set the standard for the Korean language, it does have an outsized influence, as illustrated by an example like how neomu in the sense Seoulites use it eventually spread across the entire country. The tour will also include the Koreanized English or "Konglish" words used in South Korea, their ostensibly purified substitutes mandated in North Korea, and even the curious hybrid of Spanish and Korean than has emerged in Los Angeles' Koreatown.
