MUS 503, Music in the 20th and 21st Centuries Instructor: Judith Lochhead Wednesday, 10am – 12:50pm

Music of the Present: The course studies experimental and avant-garde music practices of the present and their direct historical predecessors, starting from the middle years of the twentieth-century. Focusing on the variety of music practices during this roughly seventy-five year period, the course considers: changing styles and genres, changing electronic technologies, changing compositional thought, changing approaches to collaboration, changing critical and analytical approaches to music, changing expressive goals and expectations, changing aesthetic paradigms, changing performance paradigms, among other topics.

Learning Outcomes:

Develop an understanding of music making of the present from historical perspectives Develop listening strategies for diverse musics Develop insight into diverse approaches to music performance Develop critical and analytical strategies for understanding music of the present and its immediate historical predecessors

Course Requirements:

1) weekly attendance

2) final listening/essay exam

3) weekly listening and writing assignment 4) a short-term project (written or oral)

Readings will be taken from a range of technical, critical, creative, and analytical perspectives.

This course is suitable for all graduate students. It is required for MA students in the Composition program and also fulfills the Elective Group 1 requirement for MM and DMA students.
